HISTORY HIKE ON THE MULTI-USE TRAIL APRIL 19

Did you ever wonder about the houses and building ruins on or just off the multi-use trail?

Who lives or lived in them? What is the history of these dwellings and how old are they? Here's an event that will give you some answers to these questions.

The Friends of Ridley Creek State Park is offering a "history hike" on Saturday April 19 starting at 10 am from Area 15, which is a picnic site toward the end of Sandy Flash Drive, past the turnoff for Areas 16 and 17 - follow signs. We will begin the multi-use trail (MUT) from that point and traverse the entire loop, stopping along the way to talk about the buildings and fields we encounter.

A free one-day workshop on maintaining non-motorized shared-use trails in the park will be held on Saturday, April 26, in Broomall from 8 am to 4 pm. This event is offered by the Pennsylvania Equine Council (PEC) and hosted by the Friends of Ridley Creek State Park.

The workshop will cover trail layout, construction, and maintenance techniques; tool selection and use; and information regarding the different public land agencies. Trail workers are especially invited to attend.

The mission of the PEC is to make it easier, more affordable, safer, and more enjoyable to own equines and to participate in equestrian sports in Pennsylvania. The workshop leaders will be Bud Wills, State Trail Chair of the PEC, and Gwen Wills, Trail Stewardship Coordinator of the PEC. They host several trainings in Pennsylvania, including Packing Clinics, Horse Camp, and three-day Trail Stewardship Workshops in State College which includes

field work. Bud and Gwen have engaged a lot of people in areas that have a large equine presence.

Coffee, donuts, snacks, and a light lunch will be provided at the workshop, to be held at the Broomall Rehabilitation and Nursing Center, 50 N. Malin Road in Broomall. Pre-registration is required; call or e-mail Anita Naylor, 609-271-7484, rcptrails@comcast.net.

STREAMS CLEAN UP MAY 3

With the coming of Spring, the Friends of Ridley Creek State Park is once again joining with the Chester-Ridley-Crum (CRC) Watersheds Association to support their annual Streams Cleanup Day. Ridley participants will meet at 9 am at the Mansion on Saturday, May 3.

Jack Miller, President of the Friends, is serving as Site Coordinator for the Ridley trail workers, who attend monthly trail work days on the first Saturday of each month. His message to potential volunteers is "we intend to offer an event for anyone who wants to join us and vent a little anger on some debris,

plant protection cages, or stream blockages."

Participants will receive a T-shirt and lunch after the event at Pavilion 17 in the park. To be counted in for a T-shirt and lunch, be sure to register at CRC's website <http://crcwatersheds.org>, indicate you are with the Friends of Ridley Creek State Park in block 4 of the sign-up form, and select location #220.

With other community volunteers, you will be part of an effort shared by 27 different sites throughout the watersheds of Chester, Ridley, and Crum Creeks.

New Signage to Help Navigate Park Trails

Coming this summer, posts will be installed along trails in the park, marking trail intersections and showing the way for the yellow, white, blue, and orange trails. You may notice these posts where foot trails cross the Multi-Use Trail, cross park roads, or intersect with other trails.

The posts are being purchased by the Friends

We owe much gratitude to the Friends of Ridley Creek State Park as you did the really "nasty" job of trying to remove the invasives from the right portion of our wet meadow.

For me personally your work is a dream come true as I have wanted to re-start the project begun several years ago by the Country Gardeners - that is to establish native plants in the wet meadow that would improve the appearance of our entrance. Getting the invasives under control was a big stumbling block, and the work of the "Friends" has paved the way for us to take step two which is to treat the area with a pre-emergent in the spring.

Please let your members know that all of us at the Plantation are appreciative of your work. I hope those who worked on the project with CRC will have an opportunity to see how improved the area will look in the spring."

Tim Higgins, Treasurer and long-time Board member of the Friends, will be our guide. Learn the legend of the cow bridge, imagine the Jeffords' prize horses drinking from a horse trough that's still on the trail, hear about the grist mill from the 18th and 19th centuries, see the old one-room schoolhouse, now a private residence, and other sights.

Some of the buildings date back to the 1700s!

The full MUT walk, a paved trail, is about 4.5 miles and should take 2-2.5 hours, so dress appropriately and bring water and snacks. Please arrive on time so we can start promptly!

For those not able to do the entire walk, there will be a "drop off" point where you can turn around and

make your way back to your vehicle.
