New - and Different! - Playground in the Park




The Friends of Ridley Creek State Park are pleased to announce the installation of a new "sensory playground" at Area 8 (near the stables). It consists of imaginative panels that invite young children to hunt for treasure, listen for natural sounds, and solve some motion puzzles, among the dozen activities in this 32° x 12° space.

We are planning an official ribbon cutting ceremony for Saturday April 20 (rain date Sunday April 21) at Area 8 starting at 1 pm. You are invited to stop by, meet with the Friends and park officials, explore the new playground, and enjoy some light refreshments.

How did this project come about? The Friends Board members meet regularly with our Park Manager, Lexi Rose, to see if we can help with any special projects the park would like to have done. In 2023 the request was to improve playground access and opportunities for younger children. Swing sets, slides, and structures to climb on - this is what we usually think of in a playground. But then Lexi told us about an innovative type of playground, as described above.

We asked for ideas from different vendors and decided on purchasing the equipment from Playworld, a manufacturer in Lewisburg PA. Several dead trees were removed in December 2023 and some rough grading was done to create the playground site. The playground was assembled and installed by the Pennsylvania State Park regional crew in January 2024.



More work needed to be done to add finishing touches, such as installing a 12-inch high retaining barrier to hold in the wood chip floor of the playground. The Friends Board Members met at the site in February to review proposals for picnic tables, benches, and the playground border.

We chose suppliers and arranged payments for each item. We needed to ensure that all the items would be obtained before our March monthly trail workday on the first Saturday.

Everything worked according to plan except the weather. March 2 was a cold day with rain all day, causing a rare postponement of trail workday until March 9. A 6-foot-long park bench supplied by the Friends and a picnic table supplied by the park will give parents a place to sit and keep an eye on children enjoying the fun. We intend to do final grading of the area and plant grass seed before the April opening ceremony.

So the next time you're with young children in the park, stop by Picnic Area 8 (near the stables) to check out this new sensory playground.

The Friends of Ridley Creek State Park is a chapter of the Pennsylvania Parks & Forests Foundation and was organized by a group of loyal volunteers who had been "giving back" to their park for many years. Our mission has been to increase and enhance the quality of everyone's contact with Ridley Creek State Park. We are pleased to offer the new playground as one example of fulfilling this mission.

We appreciate our great group of volunteers, donors, and members who make these projects possible. Thanks to every one of you for helping us do what we do.

The deadline for submitting up to 3 photos is Thursday, June 20, to allow time for judging. Bring your photos to the park office, which is inside the Hunting Hill Mansion. The hours of the office are Monday through Friday, 8 am to 4 pm. When the time gets closer to the deadline, we usually set up a box outside the building for off-hour submissions.

You can submit your photos as late as Tuesday, June 25 in the morning, and they will be displayed, but they will not be eligible for an award. Mansion Tours Return in July

Last summer we reprised the free mansion tours that had been so popular in 2022 during our celebration of the 50th anniversary of the opening of Ridley Creek State Park to the public. The Hunting Hill Mansion is an historic building that serves as the headquarters of Ridley Creek State Park. Due to the narrow hallways in certain areas of the building, there is a 10-person limit on the number of participants on each tour. Last July some people missed out on this opportunity.

So we have decided to offer guided mansion tours in July again. We have reserved the mansion for half hour tours on Saturday July 27, 2024 from 10 am to 2 pm. There will be time for about 6 tours. We will request advance registration for each guided tour by asking people to sign up on a form linked to our website.

We will also offer self-guided tours of the outside of the mansion, which will help participants understand how a mansion built in 1912 had running water, indoor toilets, and underground electrical service.

In this edition of the state park tour we are going to Bucks County to visit Tyler State Park. Tyler State Park is smaller than Ridley Creek State Park at 1,711 acres, but it has many similar qualities - the biggest being that the Neshaminy Creek runs through it, giving it many of the same amenities and attractions as Ridley.

The history behind Tyler State Park is also similar to Ridley's. The land was owned by a wealthy family who operated the area as a farm. In the 1920s George and Stella Tyler started purchasing land in the area. George was a banker in Philadelphia and Stella was an artist. They lived in a small farmhouse until their sprawling 60 room mansion was built. It was 300 feet wide and reportedly the largest ever built in Bucks County.

When Stella died in 1963, the entire estate was willed to Temple University. During the following years, the mansion and its surrounding 200 acres were sold off to Bucks County. The building and gardens are now part of the Bucks County Community College campus. The mansion can be rented for weddings and events, just like

the Hunting Hill Mansion at Ridley. The remaining 1,711 acres became Tyler State Park in 1974, just 2 years after Ridley became a state park.

When it comes to activities, Tyler State Park offers both paved and dirt hiking trails. There is also plenty of space for biking, horseback riding, picnic areas, and a disc golf course. When it comes to water activities, park visitors can fish, canoe, or kayak. One of the old buildings was converted by the Langhorne Players Club into a community theatre, which puts on performances throughout the year. If visitors are not interested in physical activities, there are countless places to sit quietly and enjoy the sights and sounds of wildlife.

Tyler State Park sits about 33 miles from Philadelphia and is about a 40-mile drive from Ridley Creek State Park. It has a very rural feel and is a source of outdoor experiences for the surrounding northern suburban community. If you're ever looking to explore someplace new, Tyler State Park is worth considering.
