#### WANT TO ADOPT A TRAIL?

The Friends of Ridley Creek State Park are looking for individuals who love the park and the park trail system to adopt one section of the more than 12 miles of trail in the park.

The adopter should be willing to walk their section of trail two times a month, approximately, observing the trail overall condition, noting and reporting any conditions that need attention, such as blow-downs, erosion problems, tripping hazards or any

other safety issues, and clip back encroaching vegetation during the growing season. Tools necessary to accomplish the above can be loaned to the adopter by the Friends. The adopter can "work" on their section of trail whenever it is convenient to them – in the evening, on weekends, or any day that they have time.

This is a great opportunity to give back to the park and enjoy contributing to the upkeep of our "jewel in the suburbs." I have adopted a trail section for the past 7 years and look forward to continuing doing so for another seven. Several other adopters have kept their trail sections for 7 years as well. #### Looking for a Treasurer

There will be a vacancy on the Board of the Friends of Ridley Creek State Park for the position of Treasurer, starting this June. The current Treasurer, Tim Higgins, is not seeking another two-year term for this year's annual election. Tim has admirably served two 2-year terms as of June 2015 and his work is much appreciated.

The Board is seeking a candidate to fill this position. It does not require a background in accounting, but basic bookkeeping skills are

helpful. A computer and basic computer skills are necessary to successfully do the job. The position requires about 10 hours a month and at least one trip each month to the park office. Deposits are processed and sent to Pennsylvania Parks & Forests Foundation (PPFF) at Camp Hill, Pa. as necessary. Check requests, after Board approval, are sent to the park manager for approval. In the past, quarterly reports have been issued to the Board and an annual reconciliation is sent to PPFF.
