Spring is a popular season in our park, a time to appreciate nature and a new season of life in the woods. This year Earth Day falls on Saturday, April 22 – that makes it a convenient time to offer a hike through the trails in the park!

You'll need to send an email to membership@FriendsofRCSP.org, stating your full name and names of any others coming with you, email addresses for each one, and a contact phone number. You will be asked to confirm your attendance a few days before April 22 so please check your email during this time. Once you confirm you are coming, we will send you information about the meeting place for the hike. Significant rain will cancel the event and we will let you know the day before.

The sign up will be "first registered, first on list" of the 15-participant max. After that, we will keep a waiting list in case of cancellations.

Ridley Creek State Park Mansion Tours

October 2022, during our celebration of the 50th anniversary of the opening of Ridley Creek State Park to the public, we offered free tours of the Hunting Hill Mansion, an historic building that serves as the headquarters of Ridley Creek State Park. There was a 10-person limit on the number of participants on each tour due to the narrow hallways in certain areas of the building. Registrants for each mansion tour reached the limit very quickly and some people missed out on this opportunity.

So we have been looking for an opportunity to offer guided mansion tours again. We have reserved the mansion for tours during the weekend of July 14, 15, and 16, 2023. We will once again request advance registration for each guided tour once the schedule is confirmed. We will also offer self-guided tours of the outside of the mansion, which will help participants understand how a mansion built in 1912 had running water, indoor toilets, and underground electrical service.

A 30-page booklet written by Keith Lockhart was sold at our 50th Anniversary Celebration and will be available during the July event for \$5. It is chock full of historical photographs and articles from old newspapers that describe the people, buildings, and events from the past that led to what is currently Ridley Creek State Park.

We often display photos from past contests at our events and we publish some of them in our newsletter, as you can see here.

There will be a display of all submitted entries and a reward ceremony on Wednesday, June 21, at 6 pm in the ballroom of the Hunting Hill Mansion. Cash prizes will be given for first, second, and third place, and for honorable mention. If there are youth entries (under age 18), prizes will be given for that category.

The deadline for submitting up to 3 photos is Thursday, June 15, to allow time for judging. Bring your photos to the park office, which is inside the Hunting Hill Mansion. The hours of the office are Monday through Friday, 8 am to 4 pm. When the time gets closer to the deadline, we usually set up a box outside the building for off-hour submissions.

Board member and Events Chair Paul Mickle is organizing the contest and is selecting a judge for the event. You have the option of submitting your photos as late as Tuesday, June 20 in the morning, but they will not be eligible for an award.

Volunteering for the Friends and Appreciations for Dave Case

The Friends of Ridley Creek State Park is a volunteer organization. We truly appreciate each volunteer who shares some of their free time and talents at our activities to improve the visitor experience at Ridley Creek State Park. There is a special group of volunteers who fill positions on the Board. We need to have a Board of Directors to maintain our standing as a chapter of the Pennsylvania Parks and Forests Foundation (PPFF). We get our accident insurance from PPFF, we get training through PPFF, we get our state tax exemption through PPFF, and being a chapter of PPFF gives us credibility as a state-sponsored organization run by and for volunteers.



When a volunteer makes the commitment to become a Board member, we share the load of the administrative duties and responsibilities. This enables each Board member to spend their time in their area of expertise and minimizes their time working in areas not familiar to them. We get great ideas from Board members at our meetings, especially when we create plans to carry out projects for our park. We also solicit ideas from all our other volunteers who work on park projects.

From time to time, a Board member needs to move on from their responsibilities and then we must look for a replacement. This happened in 2017 when our Treasurer, Cate Bolduc, announced she would be moving to Las Vegas, Nevada to be nearer to her family. The Board advertised for someone to take on the Treasurer position and a member of our newsletter staff, Lauren Bacigalupi, offered to ask her husband if he would do it. She must have been very convincing because her husband accepted!

We happily welcomed Dave Case as the Treasurer for the Friends of Ridley Creek State Park. Dave quickly got up to speed with the procedures set up by PPFF and was soon accepting membership dues and donations. He also made sure the bills got paid after receiving check requests and getting Board approval and the signature of the Park Manager. It is hard to believe this was over 5 years ago. During that time, Dave kept the books straight, got checks quickly to the banks and had every expense reimbursed.

In 2022, the Friends began planning the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the opening of the park to the public, to take place on a Wednesday evening and a Saturday in October. We were struggling to deal with pre-registration for the many activities being planned, as well as what to do about publicity, crowd control, parking, refreshments, solicitation of volunteer support, signage, and much more. Dave Case introduced us to Sarah Haas, an event planner, who quickly provided all the answers – and organizing ability – that we needed to actually get the 50th anniversary event going.

Dave took the lead in the overseeing all the various activities, coordinating with Sarah, and working on the budget for the event. He prepared for and led guided tours of the mansion at the Wednesday evening event. There was so much to be done to plan a successful anniversary and Dave made it all happen. There was a lot of responsibility on his shoulders, as he had his family and a full-time job which required his attention. We found that Dave would do whatever it took to make sure the job got done properly and on time.

Dave also attended first Saturday trail work with his family. He wondered if we could get a group of volunteers to help him clear his 5 ½ acres when he was trying to keep ahead of the spring and summer growth!

Now Dave Case has announced that he will be leaving the Treasurer's position to pursue other volunteer opportunities. We would like to take this time to thank Dave for all his dedication to the Friends of Ridley Creek State Park. Dave came to our organization to fill an open position and ended up filling several other positions while maintaining the duties of Treasurer. Our anniversary celebration would not have been as successful without his input. Thank you, Dave, for sharing your time and talents with us!

Responsibilities:

- Must have access to Microsoft Excel, printer, copier, and digital scanner.
- Manage and have oversight of all aspects of the Friend's finances.
- Process reimbursement requests from other Board members.
- If possible, pick up mail from the Friend's mailbox in the park office (M-F 8am-4pm).
- Send info on new memberships and renewals to Membership Chair (if dues have been mailed, now a rare occasion).
- Be available for Board meetings, held several times a year.

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In this edition of our state parks tour we will travel west to York County and explore the southern Harrisburg suburbs and a place called Gifford Pinchot State Park. Like several other parks we've looked at, Gifford Pinchot is centered around a lake.

NEARBY ATTRACTIONS

The name of the park came from a former Pennsylvania Governor, Gifford Pinchot, who was a figurehead in the conservation community. It was designed and constructed in the 1950s and was opened to the public in 1961.

In terms of amenities, Gifford Pinchot has the traditional variety of a state park with a lake. The entire park is 2,338 acres with 340 of those acres containing the lake. Visitors can go swimming, boating, and fishing on the water and then hiking, camping, and cross-country skiing on the surrounding land. Several hiking trails go through the park with the most notable being the Mason-Dixon trail.

Overall the area has a very laid back and calming atmosphere and is mostly surrounded by rolling farm fields and woodlands. The park's 309-site campground is primarily at the southern end, although there are a few cabins scattered around the lake. The campground was built in 1968 and has all the various campground amenities, including tent accommodations, yurts, cottages, cabins, and hookups for recreational vehicles.

The nearest cities are Harrisburg and York, with roughly a 15-mile car ride through rural farmland to each of them. So for those looking for the dramatic mountain scenery in northern Pennsylvania or the quick escape from urban life, Gifford Pinchot may not be the most exciting of places, but for those who just want to enjoy nature and have a quiet experience, Gifford Pinchot is worth the trip.

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
