In addition to the various groups that are part of what makes up Ridley Creek State Park, the afternoon had various opportunities for guests to learn about what is available to the community. The Colonial Pennsylvania Plantation had a table of information and handouts, hosted by June Palomba. The Delco An-

glers were there, with Steve Kosiak answering questions about fishing in the Park.

Carol Rubin offered information about Hidden Valley Farm, the horse stable concession that resides in the park. A tour was given of the beautiful barn, office, and party room, as well as an opportunity to observe a riding lesson given by Ellie Chidester, Hidden Valley Farm's owner,

along with her h u s b a n d , Tom. Trail rides, pony rides, pony parties, horse boarding and riding lessons are all part of what makes Hidden Valley Farm special. In addition, trails running along

Ridley Creek into the park are beautiful every season of the year. Participants enjoyed the tour of this jewel that is Hidden Valley Farm.

The Ridley Creek State Park's Education Department, led by Stacey Karen Bamash, Environmental Education Specialist, used the opportunity to meet people and discuss upcoming park events. They are always looking

The Friends had our own table. Joan Nikelsky, Tony Ieradi, and John Kennedy alternated shifts at the membership end of the Friends table, offering information to people considering joining the Friends, selling T-shirts, and giving out free trees to those who joined, courtesy of Master Gardener Alyce Zellers. We gained 12 new members and one renewal. New members had a choice of trees: blue spruce, Fothergilla, and Viburnum.

At the other end of the Friend's table, Tim Higgins and Alyce Zellers acquainted guests with gardening tips and information about invasive plants. There was a slide presentation for identifying many of the invasive plants in our area, along with samples of some of the more common ones: multiflora rose, winged euonymus (burning bush),

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and Japanese barberry. Many people were surprised to learn that winged euonymus is an invasive plant problem, because it is still being sold in certain garden stores (as a primarily cheap and attractive plant in the autumn). Slides were also shown of the recent work week (April 6-10) for removing invasive plants from a high value area of the Park. Publications were available of native alternatives to invasive plants that can be used in different soil and sunlight locations, courtesy of the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.

In addition, a video was shown of some of the recent trail work done by a very active and dedicated group of volunteers that convenes in the Park the first Saturday of every month to maintain trails, build bridges, and do other work projects. The video was photographed and produced by Friends member Jim Phelan. His film featured the reconstruction of a new bridge on the blue trail.

A popular event during the Open House was the tour of the Mansion, led by our historian, Kay Ferrari. At least 40 guests participated on four separate tours that included the first floor and part of the second floor. Kay related stories about the Jeffords family, their prize-winning horses, and their connections with Sam Riddle and other Philadelphia area community leaders. She also spoke about some of the history and architecture of the building itself.

Last but not least, delicious refreshments

were prepared by Paul Mickle. Everyone appreciated the fruit and home-made cupcakes that Paul provided!

A special thanks also goes to Bernice Webb, the Park's receptionist, who responded to callers and helped promote the event.

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Invasive Plants Work Week

During the second week of April 2009, the Friends of Ridley Creek and other concerned volunteers participated in a Work Week for eradicating encroaching invasive vegetation in



a high value area of R i d l e y Creek State Park -- below picnic area 9. The work was

supervised by Resource Manager Rachel Wagoner of the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources. The location for the work was based on the recommendations of Ann Rhoads, PhD, and Timothy Block, PhD, of the University of Pennsylvania and Morris Arboretum. Drs. Rhoads and Block studied Ridley Creek State Park for a year and then published their report "Vegetation of Ridley Creek State Park".

Invasive plants such as winged euonymus, obtuse-leaved privet, Japanese barberry, Ori-

ental bittersweet, and some multiflora rose were targeted. These plants are shade tolerant and can outcompete native plants due to heavy deer browsing and an accelerated growth cycle. Native plants, having evolved over centuries of a stable ecosystem, are slow to recover so human assistance is sometimes needed.

During the Work Week, an area of approximately 40 acres was treated. The area is considered high value because much of it is, as it naturally should be, populated primarily with native plants. The shade tolerant invasive plants are just beginning to move into this area. By addressing their encroachment now, we will significantly reduce problems in the future.

The invasive plants were removed by cutting, mechanical removal (pulling them out), and with herbicide. Dr. Rhoads commented a couple weeks after the completion of this program that she considered it very worthwhile. Approximately 15 volunteers contributed over 150 hours of volunteer time during

the Work Week.

There will be a follow up program of invasive plant removal in the last week of August. We will continue working in the above mentioned area and in other areas where Paulownia, Japanese hops, and other invasive plants have been identified.
