Run, Walk, or Hike on October 2

The race, walk, and hike will start in the morning with refreshments and a chance to mingle afterwards at Pavilion 14. The hike, co-hosted by Chester-Ridley-Crum Watersheds Association, will begin and end at the Peace Wall and will run along Middletown township trails, Tyler Arboretum trails, and Ridley Creek Trails.

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All About Bats: Program with CRC on October 19

You won't want to miss this program, jointly sponsored with the Chester-Ridley-Crum Watersheds Association: learn all about our ecologically valuable and most misunderstood neighbors -- the vacuum cleaners of the night sky -- bats.

Brenda Malinics, a passionate environmentalist and animal advocate who has been working with bats and wild animals for over 25 years, will dispel myths and share important facts about why bats are the cornerstones of a healthy environment. Brenda joins us with her bat management certifi-

cate, Nuisance Wildlife License through the Game Commission, and most importantly her enthusiasm.

She will present an overview of bats worldwide, while focusing on the bats residing in Pennsylvania. Additional topics will include: white nose syndrome,

the fungus that has killed over 1.5 million bats in the last 5 years; the effects of wind turbines on bats; loss of habitat; and the impact of pesticide use on bats.

The audience will learn correct ways to remove a bat from one's house, and what to do if an injured

bat is encountered on the ground.

Brenda will suggest ways to help bats, including the installation of bat houses and bat building plans. Her presentation will be supplemented with actual bat skeletons and mounted species as well

as books, displays, and props.

Talk on Herbal Medicine on November 6

If you are interested in herbs, be sure to reserve a seat for this special event scheduled for Sunday, November 6 at 3:00 pm in the mansion ballroom.

Author and food historian William Woys Weaver will be speaking about native medicinal plants, based on their historical usage by the Pennsylvania Dutch, as presented in his 2001 publication, *Sauer's Herbal Cures, America's First Book of Botanic Healing* (published by Routledge). This event is sponsored jointly by the Friends of Ridley Creek State Park and the Eastern Pennsylvania Chapter of the American Herbalists Guild (AHG).

Sauer's Herbal Cures is a translation of the text from Pennsylvania Dutch, originally assembled by Pennsylvania apothecary and printer Christopher Sauer (1721-1784). Sauer grew up in the German immigrant community and his German was riddled with syntax and terminology borrowed from colonial English. As a skilled ethnobotanist, Mr. Weaver added footnotes and edited segments to the translation to clarify historical details for the reader.

Mr. Weaver resides in Devon and specializes in

the history of American cuisine and foodways. He is a three-time winner of the Julia Child Cookbook Award. His books include *Heirloom Vegetable Gardening*, *Pennsylvania Dutch Country Cooking*, and *Sauerkraut Yankees*. He is well known as an heirloom gardener and seed saver.

Mr. Weaver's books will be available for sale at the event and he will autograph your copy. Don't miss this unique opportunity to hear from the expert!

There will be a nominal charge for this event (cash only) of \$7 for the general public, and \$5 for members of the AHG, members of the Friends of Ridley Creek State Park, seniors, and students with ID. Space is limited and doors open at 2 pm. Come early to sample herbal teas, check out books and herbal items for sale, and talk to local herbalists. Refreshments will be served.

Planting Easy Perennials to Feed the Birds

If you visit the park, then most likely you appreciate nature, and more importantly, birds. Many backyards have bird feeders that are stocked in the winter but not as likely stocked in the summer. Like you, birds do not stop eating in the summer! If you add some bird-beneficial plants in your garden you can maintain them all year round.

Perennials are the backbone of any garden, but for birds they provide seeds, cover for moving around

safely, as well as insects, slugs, caterpillars, and other tasty treats. Fall is a great time for finding sales on perennials and for planting them. Cooler weather with more consistent rainfall helps them to establish more quickly than a spring planting.

Several perennials to consider are: Echinacea (coneflower), Boltonia, Asters, Goldenrod, Agastache (anise hyssop), Rudbeckia (black-eyed Susan), Core-

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so he took the park manager trainee test in 2004 and waited to hear from the state.

In December of 2005, he was called for an interview and was brought on board as a park manager trainee ... in Emporium. "It's 75 miles northwest of Lock Haven compared to Emporium, Lock Haven was a city!" he said, laughing. In September of 2007, he became an assistant park manager at French and Marsh Creek State Park, where he stayed until he started working at Ridley Creek State Park, in May.

Mike loves the gardens in Ridley – the rose garden, the topiary garden, and the fountain garden. "None of the other state parks have ornamental gardens like this," he said. "This was a big attraction for me."

Given his background, it's not surprising. One of

his goals is to restore the gardens to their former beauty. "I want to turn back time. Get the gardens back to looking like they did when they were first designed [in the early 20th century]," he said, adding wryly, "as the budget permits!"

It's not solely for their beauty, he said. They could help attract more people --- and events such as weddings --- to fund work that needs to be done throughout the park.

Mike and his family – his wife, Kristin, son Michael, and daughters Victoria and Erin – will soon be making the move to their new home in the park and can't wait.

"I'm really looking forward to working with the park staff, the volunteers, and other groups in the park," he said. "I've always liked Ridley Creek State Park. It's a hidden gem."

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opsis, Helianthus (perennial sunflower). There are also ornamental grasses with tassels that are excellent for providing seeds. Two of the best are Calamagrostis (feather reed grass) and Panicum virgatum (switch grass). Please do not plant Miscanthus or Pampas, as these grasses are becoming invasive and displacing natives.

Any of the above mentioned perennials are easygoing, requiring no fuss other than some additional watering to get established. To make the most impact and attract birds, plant at least three of one variety. Think of the plants as a road sign; the larger circumference it is, the easier it is to see.

By adding more bird-friendly plants to your garden, you can probably double the number of wild birds visiting your property!
